The City of Austin's newest cultural facility is housed within the Parks and Recreation Department. This center represents a long-awaited dream for many in the community, and was made possible through an Austin voter-approved 2006 Bond Package for \$5 million with a \$750,000 investment from the U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration. Members of the local Asian American community contributed pro-bono services for the design. The center opened to the public on October 1, 2013.

PERMANENT EXHIBIT



"Lotus," a sculpture featuring hand-carved granite petals and lively tile mosaic fountain, welcomes visitors at the entrance plaza. The lotus, native to Asia, was chosen for its traditional association with harmony, purification, healing, and revered symbolism within various Asian traditions.
