Volunteer for a City of Austin Grow Zone

The City of Austin's Watershed Protection Department has launched a program in collaboration with the Parks and Recreation Department and community groups to improve the health of our creeks by creating "Grow Zones". In these creekside areas, mowing is prohibited in order to allow native fauna and flora to thrive, safe from the mower's blades and compaction.

Volunteers are needed to educate and organize neighbors and friends in the active appreciation of our native riparian communities. Activities include working with Watershed Protection Biologists and local non-profits to remove invasive plants and trash, seed native grasses, build earthworks, plant and water native tree seedlings, and to collect data. Our gratitude goes out to all the dedicated and knowledgeable volunteers who provide the citizen leadership that will make this vision a reality and insure a beautiful and sustainable future for the Austin's creeks and beyond.



Benefits of Grow Zones

This more passive management style will help the City lower fuel costs and reduce its carbon footprint, but that is just the beginning of the advantages of our new approach. As vegetation grows, it provides shade to reduce air and water temperatures, thus creating a more hospitable environment for wildlife, like turtles, fish, pollinators and songbirds.

The transition area between the aquatic environment in the creek channel and the surrounding terrestrial environment is known as the **riparian zone**, and when fully vegetated, it provides many important functions. A healthy riparian zone:

- Improves floodplain function
- Prevents stream bank erosion
- Filters pollutants from storm runoff,
- Provides habitat and food for a diverse group of animals
- Provides shade that cools air and water temperatures
- Creates a greenbelt forest w/ diverse tree & plant communities
- Reduces the City's carbon footprint
- Reduces maintenance

Just as if you may call the City's 24-Hour Environmental Hotline (512-974-2550) to report pollution problems, you should call 311 if you witness the mismanagement of these spaces, i.e. mowing along the creek corridors. Let's all keep an eye out and to allow our creeks to grow. The result is a beautiful place, with ample opportunities for outdoor recreation and nature education.


