

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Texas is in a Severe Drought

- Drought is historic in proportion, may be long-term
- Dry conditions projected to persist through fall and winter if La Nina continues
- Record low inflows to Highland Lakes in 2011
- Austin's Stage 2 restrictions in effect since September 6
- Possible mandatory curtailment by summer 2012



Currently...



- Chapter 6-4 of City Code defines permanent water use restrictions and restrictions in Stages 1, 2, and 3
- City's Drought Contingency Plan (DCP) sets reduction goals and supply/demand "trigger" points
- City Manager considers whether the next restriction stage needs to be enacted to meet goals
- Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) sets supply trigger points and manages water supply



Why We're Seeking Input

- Projections indicate we may reach trigger for considering Stage 3 restrictions by summer 2012
- Current Stage 3 restrictions written for short-term emergencies
- Customer feedback on effects of Stage 2 restrictions
- Austin's drought response differs from others in the region, likely exceeds LCRA reduction targets
- Opportunity to clarify code language & implement new code requirements/policies

What We're Considering



- How do water regulations affect our customers?
- Is Austin too restrictive, or not restrictive enough?
- What water uses should be limited, and when? What should be exempt from restriction?
- Which measures should be part of long-term conservation efforts, and which should be reserved for drought response?
- How should Austin's drought response reflect longterm conservation efforts?

What We're NOT Considering

- Provisions in other parts of City Code (plumbing code, landscaping, criteria manuals)
- Water rates and revenue stability fee
- New water supply or treatment facilities
- Capital Improvements (reclaimed infrastructure)
- Conservation incentive programs

What We've Heard...



- Support for...
 - Requesting voluntary conservation before imposing additional restrictions
 - Requiring restaurants to serve water only by request
 - Enforcing water use regulations through water bill fines
 - Issuing a warning prior to a fine/citation
- Disagreement on...
 - Whether fines should differ for residential and commercial
 - Limiting irrigation to twice per week year-round


