The Vision: Imagine Austin Priority Programs


- Create a green infrastructure program to protect environmentally sensitive areas and integrate nature into the city.
 - Create a comprehensive network of parks, waterways, greenways, trails, green streets, natural areas, and other "green" features (e.g., a healthy urban forest) throughout Austin.
- Sustainably manage our water resources.
- Change Austin's development regulations and processes to promote a compact & connected city.

The Vision: Imagine Austin Priority Programs

- Develop and maintain affordable housing throughout Austin.
 - Promote affordable housing throughout Austin by continuing to encourage diverse housing types and reducing regulatory barriers
- Create a "Healthy Austin" program.
 - Promote nutrition, healthy food, and local food sources
 - Create a network of separated bicycle, walking routes, and trails

The Vision: Growth Concept Map

- Protects existing open space and natural resources such as creeks, rivers, lakes, and floodplains.
- Promotes infill and redevelopment as opposed to typical low-density "greenfield" development.
- Focuses new development in mixeduse corridors and centers accessible by walking, bicycling, and transit as well as by car.
- Provides parks and open space close to where people live, work, and play.






