### ABOUT THE LIBRARY FOUNDATION

#### Mission:

The Library Foundation supports the Austin Public Library by increasing awareness about the library and its importance to the community, and enhancing library collections, programs, and facilities.

### History:

The Library Foundation traces its origins to two support organizations for the Austin Public Library. Beginning in 1962, the Friends of the Austin Public Library provided grassroots support for Austin's libraries by coordinating advocacy activities. 

### **OUR FAVORITE THING:**

A Conversation with Cycleast's Russell Pickavance by Carl Miron

As Austin continues winning accolades, such as "Best Places to Live" by US News & World Report, and rankings as a top tourist destination, one thing we as residents have to contend with is the growth of population and changing infrastructure. Bike shops are a necessity for a community so that locals and tourists can use bicycles for commuting, in addition to leisure activities.

Carl: How does your tagline "We make bike dreams come true" define your goal for opening up the business?

**Russell:** My goal was always to build a bike shop that was friendly to every person who walked in the door. When bike shops are rude or mean to people it makes me sad, and I wanted to make a place that never did that. We always try to find value-driven brands that make high quality products but don't charge you an arm and a leg.

We believe that if you get a bike that's right for you, you will actually ride it. Then you will love it, and then you will ride it more. You will need tubes, tires, tune-ups, and you'll need work. Our job is to help you. The concept is simple: What are you looking for, what's your dream, and how do we find out what that is?

**Carl:** As the community grows in size, so does the need for space. What made you decide to share this location with Flat Track Coffee?

**Russell:** I don't mind that Austin is growing. I think growth is always hard, and I think that the people in this world are not always nice to each other. We try to be a decent and good spot in the middle of that and try to help people with this one very specific thing.

Cycleast originally moved into a little tiny space on 5th Street and Pedernales,

and Flat Track was in a tiny space in Farewell books. I would go get coffee there and became friends with the owner. We moved into this space, about four and a half years ago and then about a year and a half later, Flat Track moved in with us. They were getting out of their space, and we started talking about solutions. I always wanted to have a coffee shop in here but I knew I didn't have the time to do it myself, so it worked out.

Carl: What makes Cycleast successful and connected with the East César Chávez community?

**Russell:** I'm an urban cyclist. I like to ride in the city, I like to commute. I like supporting people who commute by bike, so I wanted to be close to downtown as possible.

Finding a space is hard. It's not like you can say "I want to be right here!" You have to see what's available and pick the best location. We got really lucky with this building—the owners are great. Our rent is going up steadily over time, but that's just the nature of the beast. It's just what happens.

Bikes can be daunting and kind of complicated. We are very good at helping people discover what their next bike will be. We take into account your experiences on a bike, we take a look at what bikes you already have, and what you want to do next, and try to find the perfect bike for your future. We love to do that—it's our favorite thing.





FROM THE DAYWOODS TO HEYWOOD:

A Hotel's Origin & Mission

I was in for such a treat when I stepped through the door at the Heywood

Hotel and discovered this little gem on East César Chávez. It is a very tastefully

decorated luxury, boutique hotel that offers an oasis from the hustle and bustle

of East Austin. Kathy Setzer, the owner, was very gracious with her time and

I loved learning about how this beautiful property came to be. Sit back and

enjoy learning about East Austin's first boutique hotel east of IH-35.

Eileen: What motivated you to do this and how did you get started?

Kathy: The idea started around 2003 or 2004. My husband George Reynolds

and I were working nonstop, sometimes eighty-hour weeks, as software

designers. We had a vision of doing something for ourselves. At my job, I was

known as the "Austin Ambassador"—when new employees moved to Austin,

my colleagues would tell them to ask me for the best things to do in Austin and

all the places to eat. Of course, some of those places are gone now. I had the

idea to open a small hotel or bed and breakfast, something that felt like Austin

and celebrated what makes Austin special.

Eileen: Why did you choose this neighborhood?

Kathy: We live on the Eastside, just south of here, in a home we bought

almost twenty years ago. We knew and loved this neighborhood and had a

connection to it.

I worked on East 5th Street and played softball at Krieg Fields on Pleasant

Valley for years. I was once the women's record holder for the Don Juan Taco

Competition down the street at Juan in a Million.

I was part of the volunteer team that started the Festival Beach Community Garden, and I ultimately became part of the East César Chávez Planning Team, where I served for more than four years.

I knew the neighborhood was really special and something to be celebrated. We found and fell in love with the house with its front porch, old long-leaf pine floors and wavy glass windows.

As we began to consider the idea of opening our business on East César Chávez, we worked hand-in-hand with the neighborhood planning team to make sure we were doing something in line with their vision. We worked hard to stick with the neighborhood guidelines. We walked the streets and met with neighbors to explain what we were trying to do—to preserve an original Austin home and give it a new purpose on what has become a busy commercial street. We wanted to build a business that showcased the East César Chávez neighborhood and helped people fall in love with East Austin.

Eileen: What year was this house built?

**Kathy:** It was built in 1925, and the two houses on either side were built around the same time, one in 1923 and the other in 1927. Through my research, I learned that our block was originally part of a larger homestead owned by the Pinget family.

Frank Pinget was from France and owned a confectionery shop on Congress Avenue in the late 1800s. He tragically died in the Great Flood of 1900, and his wife Margaret went on to raise their six children alone.

Our house was first owned by Harry and Mae Johnson. Mr. Johnson was from Sweden and worked for Southern Pacific Railroad as a switchman. Later on, the Daywood and Madrid families were long-time residents in this home, raising multiple generations here. We have been honored to host some members of the Madrid family in our hotel.

**Eileen:** What has been the coolest part of the experience of owning your own hotel?

Kathy: The best part is meeting our guests. They are seeking out a more authentic experience of Austin, and we have fun providing that for them. We created a printed neighborhood map with 99 places to walk or bike to from the Heywood. The map was designed by Molly O'Halloran who lives over on East 2nd Street—I love having so many interesting and creative people as my neighbors. Our guests get that this is a real and vibrant community, and they are excited to really experience it for a weekend or longer.

Eileen: Tell me more about the hotel's design.

**Kathy:** The hotel is a seven-room boutique hotel. There are two rooms in the original bungalow and five rooms in an upstairs addition. The five upstairs rooms circle a central outdoor courtyard, which is really an important design feature. The hotel was designed by Chris Krager and his firm KRDB, another East Austin business. It has won architectural awards.

It was important to us to keep the appearance of the original house from the street, and to keep the feel of the original bungalow with its historic pine floors and trim. But we wanted people to have this feeling of discovery when they walked in the front door. The lobby ceiling lofts up to twenty-eight feet—the height of the original roofline, and opens up to the courtyard upstairs. It's unexpected and our guests love it—they feel inspired by the design.

Eileen: What influenced you to open the hotel?

Kathy: In 2007, my husband and I lost seven people close to us and that was the

impetus to do something that really mattered to us. We wanted to be part of this community and be good neighbors. We wanted something that was our own, and so much of ourselves have gone into the hotel.

George handmade the walnut beds that are in each room, and our parents helped us so much when we were opening up. My mom even sewed the curtains! Our friends and family really rallied around us to help make it possible.

Eileen: How did you name the hotel?



Kathy: In the past, I worked in branding and marketing and helped name products, so this was really important to me. I came up with a thousand names and finally whittled it down to "Heyday" or "Heywood." With feedback from my social media community, we decided that Heywood Hotel was the winner. After our first week of business, we had a family stop in to see the hotel. They said their family had lived at this address for many years, and they were curious about the name. It turns out that they were the Daywoods! I think we may have had some help from up above when we chose our name.

Eileen: Are you able to reduce your eighty-hour weeks?

Kathy: Being a business owner is a different kind of work, for sure. It's tempting to make every minute center around the business. I have such a great staff who allows me to detach and I trust that things will be handled beautifully. We are a woman-owned and operated business. My entire staff is made up of women, most of whom have worked here for years. Our senior housekeeper has worked here for seven years, since the day we opened. Every member of our team is as devoted as I am to our mission to deliver "the perfect twenty-four hours in Austin." We are trying to guide them to the best experiences possible for their visit here. We take our jobs as hosts very seriously and know that we are representing the city and the Eastside.

Eileen: What are you proud of in your life?

Kathy: I am extremely proud to be an Austinite. I think what makes Austin special is that so many people have chosen to live here, and they are truly vested in what makes Austin special. It is such a joy to get to promote this town on a daily basis. In my personal life, I'm proud to have a husband who supports our crazy life. We have two great dogs and just recently remodeled our ranch home (which George designed) and I love how it turned out.

**Eileen:** What would you recommend for me to do for the perfect twenty-four hours in Austin?

Kathy: Grab one of the Heywood's free bikes and get ready to explore! Start with a coffee at Flat Track—I love that it's located in the same shop as Cycleast, which gives it an industrious feel. You must get the migas on corn at Veracruz All Natural, it's my favorite taco in town. Ride down to the Town Lake (excuse me, I mean "Lady Bird Lake") Trail and check out the new boardwalk, maybe take a kayak lesson from the Expedition School. We've got some great shops in our neighborhood – EA/ST Co., Fail Collective, and Corocoro are on our street, and we love Stay Gold and Take Heart just north of here. For lunch, you've got to try the brisket and ribs at La Barbecue, unless you are vegetarian, then it's Mr. Natural or Counter Culture—all East César Chávez businesses! For dinner, Bufalina has the best pizza in town, and they're just next door to the Heywood.

Eileen: Is there anything else you want to share?

**Kathy:** We are proud to be a local, independent business, and proud of our East César Chávez community. It's my life's joy to celebrate and show off our neighborhood, and I am grateful every day to be here.

### THE CORE OF THE HUMAN BEING:

An Interview with Maria "Luisa" Mendoza of Mr. Natural by Leta Ruth Moser

What is a mother to do when a child has ongoing chronic pain? Shuttling her young five-year old daughter Luisa Mendoza from one doctor to the next, Luisa's mother looked to Western medicine for diagnostics, solutions, anything to help her daughter from the debilitating leg pain she was experiencing. Despite multiple visits to countless facilities (complete with the sterile smells and hospital antiseptics), nothing worked. Until they went to a different kind of doctor, a naturopathic doctor.

"I was cured of all my problems," Luisa Mendoza, founder of Mr. Natural, shares. Her life was changed, and she now wanted to share the pathway to health with others, because, as she notes, "People need to know how and why." So, at nineteen years old, she made it her mission to help others by educating people on holistic health, and dedicated herself to promoting a wellness community and the empowering benefits of following a nutritious (and still delicious) lifestyle. While food may be the conduit for her crusade, her message is larger: nourishment is fuel for a healthy mind, body, and spirit. We must tend to all aspects.

Mr. Natural seeks to integrate Mexican and American cultures into a common mission promoting health and wholeness. "Mr." is borrowed from English, implying a degree of formality, something to take seriously. While "Natural" comes from Luisa's native Spanish tongue, and introduces the idea and practice of letting food "be thy medicine." Fusing the two ideas, Mr. Natural empowers consumers to take their health—all aspects of it—seriously and seeks to inform and educate all cultures about the importance of holistic wellness. "I wanted to set the mark for Hispanic and American health to be as rich as our cultures, to go to the core of the human being," she states.

The original site of Mr. Natural along East César Chávez replaced a Honda dealership in 1988. "It was kind of dangerous," Luisa notes of the neighborhood then, but her work was noticed, and neighbors soon started making comments

about the bridges she was building: "You have changed East Austin. I've never seen white people walk on this side [of IH-35]." Gaining momentum and desegregating Austin by offering healthy, tasty food, Luisa just kept working hard to "do what needed to be done: helping people with good food, nurturing the community, and encouraging the mind/body/spirit to heal." Luisa further observes, "The neighborhood has changed 100 percent since we began in 1988," and worlds apart from the East Austin her father experienced (when César Chávez Street was just gravel, and buggies would come through with watermelon from Luling, Texas).

She hears intergenerational stories now, from children who have grown up with her food and teachings, now bringing back their families to continue seeding the fusion of health and intercultural wellness. One customer reminisces, "I like Mr. Natural because it reminds me of my mom, childhood, and eating healthy." This holy trinity of wellness seems to be Luisa's fulfillment and joy spot—to create a family of customers. It is quite intentional that her family works together—her husband and three children are all involved the family business.

Even with the familial support, there's a constant ebb of struggles and joys for small businesses in Austin. "There's always hiring, and taxes. But the business must march on. We have many protections and blessings," she shares. Her mindset seems to imply that the hard work is all worth it, and the public has agreed. In 2008, Mr. Natural won a Small Business Award (SBA) that allowed her to attend a ceremony at the White House. Then-president George W. Bush, a Texan himself, was eager to find his people. "Where's Texas?" he asked, noticing Luisa in her short heals enthusiastically waving and smiling. There are also the on-site visits from big names—Hollywood stars frequent Mr. Natural (Ethan Hawk, Alec Baldwin, Jack Black, Matthew McConaughey, just to name a few). "I sometimes don't know who they are, only after customers point them out do I know," Luisa comments.

Rather than being star-struck, she continues to find ways to draw in the full community—a recent mural at Mr. Natural highlights "the best of the best"

vegetarians, and serves as a backdrop of history and inspiration. Her hope is that this visual will cultivate icons for new vegetarians, "to make the transition less intimidating by eating different. Look at what these great people did, and what they fed their bodies and minds. You can do that, too. They're all vegetarians—César Chávez!" The mural, painted on the side of the future Mr. Natural building portrays different people with a common value. "Healthy food doesn't have a race or culture; barriers are artificial. What do all these people have in common? They are a community of vegetarians."

As for the community of vegetarians and vegans Mr. Natural has influenced? They will continue to build bridges to create a common health community. After all, "a strong society is to have healthy people, healthy minds, and show your goodness. We are united, we are all here. Thank God," Luisa smiles.

Yes We Will!




