2024 FACE GRANT SCORING RUBRIC

Use this as a guide to how the applications will be scored.

Each question will be scored on a scale of 1 to 5. There are 100 points available. If a question is worth more than 5 points, the points given will be weighted evenly (for example, if a question is worth 20 points, a 1 will be worth 5 points, a 2 will be worth 10 points, and so on). Generally speaking, the scores will be given based on the following criteria, but specific guidelines for each question are included in the next section:

- 1. **No Response** the question was not answered, or the response is so not clear that it cannot be understood and scored by evaluators.
- 2. **Weak** the response isn't complete or missing most of the requested information and doesn't make the evaluator feel confident that the project will proceed as described.
- 3. **Acceptable, but not strong** the response includes good information, but may still leave a few questions about how the project will work or how well the project can be supported. For example, the response usually includes what the applicant will do, but may not include how or why it will be done that way.
- 4. **Strong, but could improve** the response makes the evaluator confident that the project can work well as described. For example, the response usually includes all of the requested information with explanations of how and why things will work.
- 5. **Nailed it!** the response goes above and beyond, and includes information that ties the response back to the mission of the project and how it promotes equity.

Overall successful applications will:

- Share how the community most impacted is involved in every part of the project (developed, implemented, and led by the community).
- Connect the project to building and sharing power among community members most impacted.
- Propose projects that create resources that will be impactful for the future of the community.
