

Austin Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights

The Parks and Recreation Department, along with dozens of partner organizations, created the Austin Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights (COBOR) in 2016

 In 2017, Austin City Council unanimously voted to pass the COBOR with the support of more than 1,000 citizens, key partners such as Austin Independent School District, and Mayor Steve Adler.

We believe Austin has a vested interest in ensuring all children in our city have the opportunity to connect with the natural world and help create the next generation of environmental stewards who will conserve Austin's quality outdoor space.





GREEN SCHOOL PARKS

Vision: Every schoolyard creates access to nature and fosters play and learning outdoors for all.

GREEN SCHOOL PARKS

- New vision and direction that recognizes the interconnectedness of green spaces, social change, health and climate resilience.
- Ongoing coordination between PARD + AISD on AISD Modernization which will impact 9 joint use school parks + coordination on fencing at both joint use school parks and schools adjacent to parks.
- Updated park signs for joint use school parks. Installation is ongoing and part of the coordination between PARD + AISD.
- Environmental Education Partners provided programming to 73 Austin ISD schools. 64% of the schools activated are Title 1.
- Austin ISD Environmental Stewardship Advisory Committee (ESAC) and GSP launched an amenity mapping working group to conduct comprehensive inventory of eco and park features on all Austin ISD campuses.
- Summer partnership with EcoRise and their Green Careers Academy Program. Two interns worked on amenity mapping for 6 weeks.
- 31 stewardship projects and park celebrations were completed at schools during Austin Park Foundations' biannual It's My Park Day Events.









NATURE PLAY

Vision: Building a world where all children can explore nature through play.

NATURE PLAY

- Updated strategy vision
- Nature play spaces installed at 5 parks, including last pilot site, with 14 additional sites in design
 - Community advocating for nature play to be added
- Loose parts lending kits used by 1587 people
- Infrastructure Subcommittee quarterly meetings ongoing
- Wood degradation of nature play features tracked by Youth Forest Council

- Procurement ongoing:
 - Hornsby Bend collection
 - Old Lampasas Dam project
 - Materials moved to Trevino as permanent storage location

Emerging Green Leaders Vision: Collaborating to build an Austin in which young people can easily access careers in outdoors, nature, and the environment, are fairly compensated for their contributions, and that the field, and leadership within, represents the communities we serve.

Emerging Green Leaders

- Combination of in-person + virtual meetings: Nature Networking, Adult-Youth Collectives, Culture Change/ Building a net that works
- Participants:

 - 215 participants
- Increased Committee Chairs

- Normalize talking about race & racism with stakeholders, partners, participants, leadership
- Gather to talk about green careers and opportunities, network with professionals

- Provide Green Career Development workshops
- Creating pathways into naturebased jobs:
 - <u>Emerging Green Leaders Job</u> <u>Opportunities</u>
 - <u>Austin Civilian Conservation</u>
 <u>Corp</u>: 38 summer temp jobs at COA, 13 still employed
 - <u>Youth Forest Council</u>: 13 interns













OLE! AUSTIN

Vision: Improve outdoor spaces at childcare centers to enable 0-5 year olds to be active, learn in nature and develop motor skills.

OLE! AUSTIN

- Congratulations to the coalition's work during the first 5-year cycle:
 - 16 childcare centers actively participated - a big COVID win!
 - 2 are active OLE! demonstration sites
- OLE! Contract now with TCiNN, efforts to include:
 - Professional development
 - Local site visits
 - TCiNN Summit Tract on early childhood education
 - EE newsletter specific
 - Best Practice Quality Seal

- Local coalition regrouping with initial goals:
 - Recenter equity
 - Resources + Networking
 - Mentorship + Professional Development
 - TCiNN hosting <u>shared Google</u> <u>folder</u> - resources, photos, etc.
 - Meetings rotating between Centers with a focused topic each month
- Abiding Love Children's Center hosted Texas Tech Coalition for Natural Learning Community Engagement & OLE design

Vision: Foster connections to nature through stories, experiences, and resources to promote curiosity and environmental literacy.

- Updated APL Programming Manual to prioritize NSL programming into future library offerings
- Partnership with Parks & Recreation for loose parts lending kit to circulate between library branches
- Plant parties & nature-based story time during Roots & Wings Festival
- Environmental programs embedded in over 300 summer events across the library system
- Texas State intern project focused on promoting equitable access to nature-related resources

- Pollinator garden at the Ruiz Branch












